Next year, Voces will celebrate a milestone: **25** years of telling the Latino/a story and sharing our contribution to our nation's fabric. The reflection, however, on what's changed and what hasn't has already begun. The testimonials in our **WWII** archives of young GIs returning to a hostile environment at home don't feel that distant. The issue of **representation** in the media highlighted in our interviews with Hispanic documentary filmmakers continues to be a discussion **today**. And the voting rights lawsuits occurring throughout the South in these past months are eerily similar to stories in our **civil rights archives**, which recount events dating back **decades**.

We could go on. What is clear to us is that telling our story, **sin pelos en la lengua**, and claiming our space in the national narrative is as essential today as ever in our history

That's why Voces has dedicated much of this year to sharing our story with peers, academics, and historians across the country, from presenting at the National Association for Chicana and Chicano Studies Tejas Foco conference in Brownsville, to participating in the Oral History Association conference in Baltimore, and being back in person for the Voces Summer Institute to train the next generation of oral historians. Rest assured, we've conducted more interviews and more research that you will read about in the following pages, because as Latino contributions evolve and grow, Voces will be here to ensure our story is captured and on the record.


We presented on **Voces of a Pandemic**, our 13-institution partnership that recorded interviews with 436 Latinas/os nationwide.


